Our mission is to advance quality care for plastic surgery patients and promote public policy that protects patient safety. Our members are highly skilled surgeons who improve both the functional capacity and quality of life for patients, including treatment of congenital deformities, burn injuries, traumatic injuries, hand conditions, and cancer reconstruction.

Your championing of the Accessible Care by Curbing Excessive lawSuitS (ACCESS) Act, which will improve the current medical liability climate in the United States, is invaluable. Medical liability reform will help achieve health system savings by reducing the incentives for defensive medicine, and it will also protect physicians from unaffordable liability premiums. Medical liability reform efforts in states such as California and Texas have shown that changes to the medical liability standards can help improve access to health care for patients, reduce runaway insurance premiums, and create a stable, predictable liability system.
